I am writing you out of concern that the town might allow pickle ball courts in our residential area. I wish to bring to your attention the extreme detriment that pickle ball courts have on any neighbor that is unfortunate enough to hear the activity. The town of Chilmark is special for its beauty, quiet and nature. Noise travels incredibly well here and I do not wish to be put into a situation where the quiet enjoyment of my property is put at risk. I have much literature to share with you in regard to noise from pickleball starting with an EPA study done in 2021 in which the EPA states pickleball noise exceeds noise standards. Pickleball has a history of community noise complaints. West Tisbury does not allow individual pickleball courts in homes and I want Chilmark to do the same. Many years back I had an issue with noise from pool equipment on a property on Wakeman road. It took 5 years of back and forth before issue was resolved and I had to suffer during it. I was told to call the Chilmark police every time I heard the noise and the police had to come to my home, hear the noise, then drive to property on Wakeman rd to confirm it was coming from there before the issue was finally resolved. It was not a pleasant experience and needless to say created great animosity with my neighbor in question. Please allow me to share some of the information I have and consider using the exclusionary zoning that I believe we have. If it is not specifically permitted, it is excluded. Thank you
